



## FATALITY MANAGEMENT EMBALMING AND CASKETING MORTUARY SPECIALIST

<b>OVERALL FUNCTION</b>	The Fatality Management (FM) Embalming and Casketing Mortuary Specialist coordinates with the Morgue Processing Unit Leader, Medical Examiner, or Coroner to set up and determine embalming requirements and the appropriate methods for embalming human remains
<b>COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. This position can be ordered as a single resource.</li> <li>2. This position can be ordered with a NIMS typed unit (Fatality Management Morgue Processing Unit).</li> <li>3. Discuss logistics for deploying this position, such as working conditions, length of deployment, security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment</li> </ol>

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.

<b>DESCRIPTION</b>	<p>The FM Embalming and Casketing Mortuary Specialist:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Manages the embalming-casketing staff</li> <li>2. Coordinates with the Morgue Processing Unit Leader, Medical Examiner, or Coroner to set up and determine embalming requirements and the appropriate methods for embalming human remains</li> <li>3. Orders sufficient supply of embalming and casketing equipment and supplies</li> <li>4. Coordinates with state and local funeral directors for assistance through the Medical Examiner or Coroner, if necessary</li> <li>5. Exercises the application of specialized techniques for pre-embalming, embalming, and post-embalming processes such as reconstructive cosmetology, where appropriate, to enhance view-ability</li> <li>6. Reports directly to the FM Morgue Processing Unit Leader</li> </ol>	Not Specified
<b>EDUCATION</b>	Completion of post-secondary educational requirements for certification and to function as a licensed Embalmer	Educational instruction for an Embalmer may vary by state or territory.
