This position can be ordered as a single resource or in conjunction with a NIMS typed team (Emergency Care Task Force).</li> <li>2. Discuss logistics for deploying this position, such as working conditions, length of deployment, security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment</li> <li>3. Discuss need for a pharmaceutical cache</li> </ol>

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.

Currently works in a healthcare setting, such as a pharmacy, hospital, health system, agency, or service commensurate with the mission assignment</li><li>3. Immunizations up-to-date and commensurate with mission assignment</li><li>4. Background checks as applicable law permits or requires</li></ol>	Provider must carry out and use any background checks as applicable law specifies. This may include a background check completed within past 12 months, sex offender registry check, and a local, state, and national criminal history.
<b>PROFESSIONAL AND TECHNICAL LICENSES AND CERTIFICATIONS</b>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. State, the District of Columbia, or US territory-granted active status of legal authority to function as a Registered Pharmacist without restrictions</li><li>2. Current Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) registration</li></ol>	Not Specified
