COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS	1. This position can be ordered as a single resource or in conjunction with a NIMS typed team (Fatality Management Human Remains Recovery Team). 2. Discuss logistics for deploying this position, such as security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment 3. This position typically works 12 hours per shift, is self-sustainable for 72 hours, and is deployable for up to 14 days

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.

Moves remains into human remains pouches or other suitable human remains transportation containers or vehicles 3. Uses proper lifting techniques with other specialists to move human remains from location of discovery to a designated human remains collection point for transport to the temporary morgue site 4. Reports directly to the FM Human Remains Recovery Team Leader	Not Specified
