OVERALL FUNCTION	The Fatality Management (FM) Personal Effects Specialist coordinates with the FM Morgue Processing Unit Leader to determine documentation, packaging, and transfer-to-storage requirements for personal effects recovered from human remains during morgue processing
COMPOSITION AND ORDERING SPECIFICATIONS	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. This position can be ordered as a single resource. 2. This position can be ordered with a NIMS typed unit (Fatality Management Morgue Processing Unit). 3. Discuss logistics for deploying this position, such as security, lodging, transportation, and meals, prior to deployment 4. This position typically works 12 hours per shift, is self-sustainable for 72 hours, and is deployable for up to 14 days

Each type of resource builds on the qualifications of the type below it. For example, Type 1 qualifications include the qualifications in Type 2, plus an increase in capability. Type 1 is the highest qualification level.
